BOARD CHAIR MESSAGE



[Pembina Hills School Division](#) is thriving under a relatively new school board and superintendent.

On February 28 it was announced that the division would receive funding for the rightsizing and modernization of Barrhead Composite High School. Previous 3-year Capital Plans had included three project proposals. However, earlier this year, the board voted to submit only one proposal, that being Barrhead Composite High School. We hope to engage participation from our municipal partners in this endeavor.

In the past the board would have a meeting in a designated month in a school. Now, there is no board meeting when we visit a school. Administration provides the board with an overview of the school and its programs and then there's a tour with classroom visits. The newest addition to the school visit is meeting with students and engaging in a conversation with them in order to hear their "voice." We are excited to be able to continue this and eventually to bring together students from selected schools so that we can understand the different needs and of course the triumphs from across Pembina Hills.

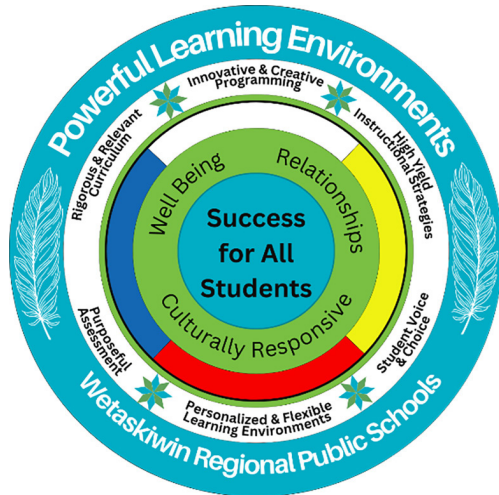
Pembina Hills is very pleased to participate in the [Alberta Education pilot project for mental health](#). Our Assistant Superintendent, Dr. Rob McGarva, has indicated that the hiring of two more student and family advocates ties in nicely with Dr. Michael Ungar's message that students and families need assistance to negotiate and navigate the support they need. Pembina Hills now has 4.4 full time employee advocates who help to address issues that were previously beyond the scope of existing personnel. They are able to take a broader approach in addressing the barriers to student success with their training and experience in the field of social work and human services.

BOARD CHAIR MESSAGE

Wetaskiwin Regional Public Schools (WRPS) has much to celebrate in 2023. In August, 2022, we welcomed our new Superintendent, Mike Wake, who brings enthusiasm, innovative ideas and genuine team spirit to our Division.



We have developed a new vision for WRPS:

Vision

We open doors to a bright future for all children where they experience success, reach their potential, and continue to find joy and happiness in life.

We have been very intentional about our work in bringing the calls to action of the TRC to life and have developed the following statement (action plan) to guide us in our work:

Our Practices in Kinship with the Community:

- We create safe, caring and inclusive learning environments for all children by embedding the spirit of Truth and Reconciliation in our actions and relationships.
- We commit to learning and educating about how systems of oppression dispossessed Indigenous peoples of their land and denied the right to self-determination.
- We continually champion and enhance WRPS as a positive, innovative and responsive place to learn and work.

I am pleased to report that all of our trustees have enrolled in the “Indigenous Canada” course and some have already completed all of the modules.

We are excited to introduce new opportunities for our students that will begin in the fall. These include a drone program in all of our high schools, new CTS opportunities, and a Hockey Academy, which we hope to expand across our entire division. We are also committed to continue to identify unique opportunities to enhance the educational experiences of our students.

We have also revamped our committee structure into three main committees; Education, Governance, and Finance and Facilities. This structure has helped us to become much more focused and efficient with our work.

Our board has also been very intentional about community engagement and has met with the local Municipalities and County, MLAs, business leaders, staff, and the community as a whole.

We are very fortunate to have Joline Bull on our Board. Joline has been instrumental in leading our work on the Calls to Action, and facilitating cooperation and collaboration with MES. Joline is an athlete, scholar, natural leader, whose work has been featured through her presentation at the Hawaii International Conference on Education January 2023. The following is a brief synopsis of her work:

Tan’si, Nitsiykason osawamostosiskwew, ohci niya kisipatnahk.

I am from the Louis Bull Tribe. I am Maskwacis Plains Cree and I understand the Cree way of life. I was raised in a traditional home fire with fluent Cree speakers. Teaching us as children, who we are and where we come from.

The pragmatic policy approach supported in this ethnographic history critically engages with political events that affected the First Nations in Canada and focus’ on the policy needed to address Indigenous issues in Canada. To illustrate the imperial intentions of policy affecting First Nations in Canada, the topic of indigenous languages has a historical context to address. The need to understand natural law and Indigenous Worldview will be shared. A decolonial framework will be used to describe the discourse between Indigenous Nations and the Canadian Government. A bilateral agreement is the governmental tool needed to strengthen the relationship-building with First Nations.

The tensions that arise along this process of policy are real and must be addressed to attain strategies for language learning in the Canadian education system.

The publication of the article “Strengthening Identity through Policy: On Cree Language and Culture Revitalization”

WRPS is excited about the future of our division as we look to the future and the opportunities that await us.

Wilson Bearhead (Friday, June 2)

Wilson Bearhead is a Nakota Elder and member of the Wabamun Lake First Nation in Treaty 6 Territory. Wilson has served as the Chief of his community, Grand Chief of Treaty 6 and the Assembly of First Nations Alberta Regional Chief. He began his career in the field of addictions, mental health and supports for children in care. Over the years Wilson has dedicated his time to service the community, families and children, in roles that include Elders at federal corrections agencies, public libraries and in schools. Most recently Wilson served as the Elder for Elk Island Public Schools.



Seneca Crowe (Friday, June 2)

Seneca Crowe is one of the founders of Roots of Resilience, a non-profit organization that supports systems to decolonize and works towards eliminating racism, sexism and discrimination through an Indigenous cultural lens. Seneca is a member of the Kahkewistahaw First Nation in Treaty 4 territory.

Seneca's career has been focused on Education working to support Indigenous youth in their endeavors to navigate the public education system in Alberta, and to inspire non-Indigenous youth to confront long held views of Canadian history through the experiences and lens of Indigenous peoples and the complex relationships with the people of this land. Starting her career in Fort Saskatchewan Elementary school as the First Nations, Métis and Inuit Lead in Elk Island Public

Schools, she then went on to become a Braided Journeys coach with Edmonton Catholic Schools before moving on to become the National Education Strategist for the Moose Hide Campaign.

Indigenous Peoples Atlas of Canada Education Kit and Floor Map

Royal Canadian Geographical Society has worked collaboratively with several Indigenous and ally educators and organizations from across Canada to create the Indigenous Peoples Atlas of Canada Education Kit and Floor Map.

Rather than political borders, this map shows the locations of Indigenous communities, residential schools, reserves and more. The map shows Canada as being broken up into Indigenous language groups rather than provinces to represent the precolonial movements of indigenous peoples and provide imperative education to all. This resource will assist students and teachers alike in understanding the past, present, and future of Indigenous Peoples in Canada.

PSBAA has received a copy of this kit and floor map, which is 10.7m (35.1') x 7.9m (25.92'), to be utilized by our members for free. The kit contains a floor map, teacher's guide and hard copies of the learning activities.

Board Questions Answered

Q3: When is a written report adopted?

There are different sources of written reports, such as: officer, committee, teller, treasurer and auditor. There may be times when written reports are for information only, such as a summary of action taken, whereas other reports include background research with recommendations for action. The recommended actions should be in written form as main motions and placed at the end of the report. It is these main motions which require a decision as to whether to authorize the recommended action.

The board, with few exceptions, should NOT vote to adopt, accept, approve, or receive a report after the report is provided. Doing so indicates the board endorses and supports every word in the report as a statement of the board. For example, a treasurer's monthly report should NOT be adopted as that would create a potential liability to the board as the report has not been audited. The board has no way of knowing if the report is accurate or not; the report is part of the information provided to the auditor. The exceptions that qualify for approval of a report are the auditor's report with the annual financial statements; and the annual report or similar document intended to be published externally.

A report, from an officer or a reporting member of a committee, is considered received by the group through the action of providing the report. Minutes record actions of the meeting; therefore, the action of providing the report will be entered in the minutes as: The report was received and will be filed.

Language Teacher Bursary Program

Applications for the 2022/23 Language Teacher Bursary Program are now open! The program will support teachers of languages, other than English, to improve their fluency, pedagogical skills and knowledge to help Alberta School Jurisdictions enhance their language teaching capacity. The program is administered by Alberta Education and funded by Advanced Education.

There are two bursaries available:

The first is the [International Language Teacher Bursary](#) which provided up to 10 bursaries of up to \$5,000 each for Alberta certificated teachers of international languages. This program is a summer course at a recognized post-secondary institution outside of Canada. The deadline to apply is April 30, 2023.

The second is the [Indigenous Languages Teacher Bursary](#) which provides up to two bursaries of up to \$2,500 each for Indigenous language teachers, Elders or instructors to take post-secondary studies. The deadline to apply is May 20, 2023.
