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PRESIDENT'S BLOG

Vote For an Excellent, Accessible, Equitable, Education



As we know the importance of democratically elected trustees is vital to the oversight and value provided within the public school system. Voted in by a universal electorate, where everyone is able to vote, trustees work hard to set goals, advocate for public schools, lobby the government and focus on accountability to ensure public schools remain a key pillar in society providing equity to all. As stewards of millions of dollars in public funds, trustees are accountable to the very taxpayers who voted them in. That says a lot!

Now let's think about the provincial election. Do charter and private schools follow this same process of accountability and democracy to ensure their school systems are run the same way? Are they freely equitable? The answer to these questions is a resounding no! When

thinking about who to vote for in this election, think about which candidate and which political platform best aligns with and best supports a truly equitable public school system.

Over the last few years, we have seen more public funds being diverted from public schools to charter schools, in essence doubling administration costs. In fact, the recently announced purchase of the SMART Technologies building at the University of Calgary Research Park further validates the commitment to charter schools. Why is this happening for a select few when charter schools are not accessible to everyone? Why is this happening when public schools are in immediate need of new buildings themselves? Think about that.

Something else to consider this election is that charters schools receive 100% per pupil funding, the same as public, separate and Francophone schools. Why is this when only public schools are accessible to everyone without religious or financial stipulations? Charter and private schools also have different tuition fee structures that often require parents to contribute high financial costs for enrolling their children. With this extra financial injection, why are we subsidizing these school systems?

Ask yourself this when considering who to vote for this election, which candidate truly believes in equity for all Albertans? Which platform supports democratically elected trustees to oversee school systems on behalf of the taxpayers? Which platform supports and acknowledges the excellent PISA results that public schools have proven to deliver to Albertans? Who supports public schools and equitable education for all our youth?

So how can you get informed on who to vote for? Look at candidate platforms, and more importantly party leader platforms. Review their stance on public schools and read between the lines. Look at the party's history regarding their education beliefs and actions.

Need more information on public schools? Review some of the information we have created here that talks about just some of the priorities public schools advocate for. Or take a look at our activity on social media, we have been busy creating content to advocate for public schools.

Most importantly, get out and VOTE on May 29! Remember one of the perks about living in a democracy is that we all have a choice, and we have a voice, so use it. Don't sit on the sidelines and hope the government delivers what you and your family need to have a successful education system. Vote for the future generations who deserve an excellent, accessible, equitable, education.

GOOD NEWS STORY

Lethbridge School Division Students are Playing a Key Role on iGEM Team



Lethbridge Public School Division (LPSD) students continue to play a key role on the Lethbridge High School iGEM team. iGEM is an international organization dedicated to the advancement of synthetic biology, education and competition and community, and last year, the LPSD team reached the pinnacle, at the iGEM 2022 Grand Jamboree and took home a gold medal after a prestigious trip to France.

Laura Keffer-Wilkes, from the University of Lethbridge, who has been the primary investigator for the Lethbridge High School iGEM team program since 2018, said:

On “our 2022 project, Dia-Beatable, received a gold medal in Paris last year...We were using a self-amplifying mRNA to deliver the insulin gene to diabetes patients, in order for them to produce their own insulin - similar to how the COVID mRNA vaccine works. We were able to collaborate with Dr. Anna Blakney, a lead researcher in SA-mRNA technologies, at UBC.”

The gold medal placed Lethbridge students in the spotlight, thanks in part to current and former Division students. Members of the 2022 team included Amanda Dang from Wetaskiwin Composite High School (WCHS), Amber Quo (WCHS grad), Aubrey Nilsson (WCHS), Grace Cofell from Lethbridge Collegiate Institute (LCI), Jayabhishek Chaudhary from Chinook High School (CHS), Karma Patel (WCHS), Lisa Sallah (Chinook grad), Marie Metz (LCI), Masataro Tatsuno (WCHS), Morteza Faraji (CHS), Priyanshi Patel (LCI), Raiyana Shams (WCHS), Samreet Mutti (WCHS), Steven Yang (WCHS) and Zitong Wu (WCHS).

The 2023 iGEM season is also off to a strong start, according to Keffer-Wilkes.

“We received \$2,500 in start-up funding through the MindFuel Tech Futures Challenge...[and] we also competed in a project pitch competition and an iGEM skills workshop.”

The project pitch competition was held as part of the Tech Futures Challenge (hosted by Mindfuel) on Feb. 25, 2023. The pitch video can be found here: [TECH FUTURES](#).

Keffer-Wilkes added that LPSD 2023 iGEM project, ANA-lyze This, will attempt to create a rapid-diagnostic tool to detect anti-nuclear antibodies, which are increased in patients suffering from autoimmune disorders such as MS, arthritis and lupus, among others.

“We hope to create a bedside test that doctors can use to help diagnose patients, instead of the longer processing times for current methods. We will compete in a few more competitions this year in order to practice our project talks and win some money to support our team.”- Keffer-Wilkes

The team’s goal now includes preparing for the 2023 Grand Jamboree in Paris, which is scheduled for Nov. 2-5.

“All iGEM teams can go to Paris but they have to meet certain requirements to be eligible for medals,” said Keffer-Wilkes. “We have been the only Canadian high school team to compete internationally in the 2021 and 2022 seasons. We ask team members to cover their costs to travel to Paris, flight and accommodation, and we fundraise to cover the cost of the team registration. It is very expensive.”

Alberta Women in Science Network (AWSN) provided the Lethbridge team with some funding last year, to send a deserving student to Paris that otherwise could not afford to go, she added. As for the benefits of being involved in the diverse group of iGEM team members, Keffer-Wilkes mentioned students develop an impressive set of competences.

“Students learn so many different skills. All of our project websites are coded by the team. They learn all about project management, teamwork and leadership. They learn about market research, design and stakeholder engagement. They also learn wet lab skills that sets them up for success in university. It is a great program.”- Keffer-Wilkes

The 2023 team is made up of 20 students ranging from Grade 10 to Grade 12 from LCI, Winston Churchill High School, Catholic Central High School (CCH) and CHS. Teachers Riley Kostek (CHS) and Robert Balog (CCH) have both volunteered their time to help work with the team this year.

Leaders of Tomorrow Awards Program Wetaskiwin Regional Public Schools



The **Leaders of Tomorrow** Awards is a youth volunteer recognition program which encourages nominees to continue their involvement in volunteerism and leadership activities. Since 1989 the program has been available to any city or town and in 1996 the Wetaskiwin and Area Leaders of Tomorrow steering committee felt it was important to bring this program to the City of Wetaskiwin, County of Wetaskiwin, Town of Millet, and later Maskwacis.

Over the past 25 years, the Wetaskiwin and Area Leaders of Tomorrow program has successfully recognized 716 outstanding nominees for their contributions to our community through voluntary action and leadership. Nominations are divided into four age categories: 8 - 11 years, 12 - 14 years, 15 - 17 years and 18 - 21 years. Just this year 15 people were nominated.

Donations are accepted from various service clubs, but the program is mainly funded by community sponsors who also provide a member to sit on the committee. An executive director is hired to handle nominations, communication, and event preparations. Nominations are accepted from individuals, groups such as dance, sports, churches, museums, 4H, as well as Sacred Heart Catholic School. However, the majority of

the nominations come from teachers in the **Wetaskiwin Regional Public School Division**, recognizing students from all the schools in the Division.

We believe each and every nominee is a winner and although this program is not considered a “contest”, we do recognize the nominee who stands out above the rest for their commitment and leadership in assisting others. One individual is selected from each age group as the Representative who best demonstrates leadership and the spirit of volunteerism.


One of the most important principles of the program is that each nominee is recognized for their own work, contributions and leadership skills, large and small. To that end, all the nominees are invited to a public Awards Event held at Reynolds-Alberta Museum during Volunteer Week. The Awards Event ceremony begins with a piper and RCMP in red serge leading in the parade of nominees. Each nominee is individually welcomed onto the stage while their biography is read aloud, followed by accepting their various awards from members of our community sponsors. Awards for all nominees include a commemorative t-shirt, a copy of their biography and certificates from Leaders of Tomorrow, local MLA and MP.

The Representatives of each age group also receive a trophy and a \$100 cheque which they donate to a non-profit organization of their choice on stage at the Event. Local newspapers also provide coverage of the Awards Event. After the ceremony all in attendance (usually 100+) gather for refreshments and cake/ice cream.


All nominees and representatives receive a professional photo taken at the Awards Event and offered the opportunity to participate in a one day free leadership experience at the 4H Center at Battle Lake.

Leaders of Tomorrow Awards: Providing the opportunity to put positive role models in the limelight, inspiring the spirit of volunteerism, and development of leadership skills.

Shell Canada provides social investment programs that support the communities around their operations as well as national programs that provide lasting benefits to Canadians across the country. Explore – Second Language Program

Explore is an intensive language immersion program that provides opportunities for English-speaking students to study French, and for French-speaking students to study English.

The program has two categories one for ages 13-15 and the other for 16, 17, or 18+. For 13- to 15-year-olds, three-week summer sessions are available. Some virtual Explore sessions are offered for those who are unable to participate in person. For participants 16 and older, Explore sessions are offered during the spring or summer, which last between 31 and 33 days.

The program contributes \$2,400 for each participant 13 to 15 years old and \$3,350 for each participant 16 years and older. This covers the costs of tuition, instructional materials, meals, and lodging.
